The short course is organized by Master of Public Health, JC School of Public Health and Primary Care, The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

PROGRAMME OBJECTIVES

A bachelor's degree preferably in medicine or an approved related field. For non-professional degree holders, honours not lower than second class are required.

TEACHING FACULTY

- Courses will be taught by the academic staff, and the affiliated local and international staff, of JC School of Public Health and Primary Care.
- To meet the multi-disciplinary demands of the curriculum, JCSPHPC engages teaching staff from local faculties of nursing, economics, law, pharmacy, business, journalism, geography, and social sciences. We also engage outside experts and collaborates extensively with stakeholders in public health practice, such as the Department of Health, Hospital Authority, Food and Environmental Hygiene Department, and other public institutions..
- JCSPHPC will continue to capitalise on its long established network of international schools of public health (e.g. Johns Hopkins University; University of Oxford; London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine; Peking University; and Fudan University), as well as an extension network of public health institutions such as the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (US CDC), Chinese Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC China), Shenzhen CDC, Bureau of Health of Shenzhen Municipality, and British Columbia Centre for Disease Control (BC CDC) of Canada.

HPSB5001P Introduction to Health & Social Behaviour

(3 credits)

Course Description

The course provides students with an introduction to the basic concepts of health and social behaviour that frame public health promotion programmes. Students will learn about the process of creating and implementing health promotion programmes in the community using internationally accepted best practices. Case-studies & guest speakers will highlight the concepts taught. The main deliverable is a project protocol.

Student should be able to: Appreciate inter-disciplinary approaches in health improvement ; Understand how to design, implement and evaluate health improvement programs using common theoretical frameworks; Appreciate the role of community involvement, grass-roots organizations, advocacy groups and the role of government in health promotion; Become familiarized with real-life examples of health promotion projects

HSOC5006 Medical Sociology

Course Coordinator: Prof. YH CHENG

(1.5 credits)

Course Description

The course provides an opportunity to students to understand issues of health care in society from various sociological perspectives. Individuals are social beings who are subject to the influence between social structure and human agency. Concerning health and illness, other than the pathological elements, the sick person is inevitably affected by a wide range of social variables and personal behaviour. The macroscopic and microscopic perspectives in understanding the issues of health and illness in context are important in the course of service delivery and policy making.

Students should be able to:

1. analyse concepts and ideas about health and illness in context
2. suggest effects of social groups and social institutions in shaping individuals' health and illness behaviour
3. synthesize sociological perspectives in understanding issues arising from health care in society

HSYS5001P Health System Policy and Management

Course Coordinator: Prof. PH CHUNG

(3 credits)

Course Description

This course is an introduction to the basic principles of management, strategic planning, quality assurance, health economics and financing, and health policy analysis that serves as a foundation to more advanced coursework in health policy & management. This course is benchmarked to meet most of the competencies of the Part A, Diplomate Membership level of the UK Public Health Examination, the US Certified Public Health Exam of the Association of Schools of Public Health as well as Part I Examination in Administrative Medicine of the HK College of Community Medicine.

Learning Outcomes/Objectives

The objective of this course is to acquire an understanding of the basic principles of healthcare system, policy, financing, and health economics. Students will become familiar with the basic management theories and concepts that underlie the operations of healthcare organizations. The course will familiarize students to structure, process and outcomes of health services and students will learn to apply systems thinking to resolve organizational issues.

The course emphasizes on learning through reflection and practical application of key concepts in organisation and management supported by real case examples. This course is designed to meet most of the Basic Specialist Training and Part I Examination curriculum in Administrative Medicine of the HK College of Community Medicine. This course is also a prerequisite requirement for other courses taught in the second year of the MSc programme.

HSYS5004 Health Care Systems and Policies

(3 credits)

Course Description

This course will build on the content of HSYS5001, and students will gain advanced understanding on the structural and functional characteristics of health systems and policy framework. Through in- class interactive discussions and group presentation, students will acquire competency in analyzing factors which impact on health service delivery and health policy making process. Students will also be exposed to basic methodology in health policy research & analysis.

Pre-requisite: HSYS 5001

Learning Outcomes/Objectives

Through studying this course students will be able to :

1. Apply health systems frameworks in providing insight for effective functioning and strengthening of health systems and need to co-ordinate care in service delivery. 2. Assess the role of private sector in mixed health systems and the public private partnership. 3. Understand structural determinants of policy process. 4. Understand the role of theory in framing health policy questions, and apply case study methodology in conducting policy analysis.

OENV5001P Environmental Health Sciences

Course Coordinator: Prof. KF HO

(2 credits)

Course Description

This course is designed to provide a general understanding of how the environmental factors affect human health and what we can do to prevent or minimize the negative impacts. It examines health issues, scientific understanding of causes, and possible future approaches to control of the major environmental health problems in industrialized and developing countries

Learning Outcomes/Objectives

Student should be able to:

1) Describe epidemiology & toxicology methods used to assess the impact of environmental exposures on human health; 2) Identify and define the steps in the risk-assessment and risk-management; 3) Explain how factors, such as risk perception, law and socioeconomic condition, may influence the practice of environmental health; 4) Define the major sources and types of hazards in the environment and workplaces; Describe the direct and indirect health effects of major environmental and occupational agents; 5) Describe general principles of environmental pollution mitigation and occupational hazard control; 6) Describe regulatory programs, guidelines & authorities on environmental health.

OENV 5011 Environmental Risk Management & Communications

Course Coordinator: Prof. TW WONG & Prof. PH CHUNG

(2 credits)

Course Description

This module builds upon the principles taught in OENV 5010 (Environmental Risk Assessment). The course gives students basic knowledge of the frameworks used for risk reduction and the protection of human health from chemical, physical, biological and ergonomic hazards. Students will be exposed to environmental risk communication frameworks and practical guidance on report writing for stakeholders and for future policy formulation.

Pre-requisite: OENV5010

Learning Outcomes/Objectives

After completing this course, students should be able to:

1. Describe different approaches for preventing, and managing biological, chemical, physical and ergonomic hazards that pose risks to human health and safety.
2. Be able to demonstrate an understanding of the decision process behind the management of environmental and infectious disease risks and provide justification for the prioritisation of different risk management actions.
3. Describe methods for risk reduction & control for chemical, physical, biological and ergonomic hazards at local and international levels.
4. Be able to formulate preventive action and risk control programs including programs for surveillance.
5. Describe the roles of risk communication in environmental health and its role in the policy process.
6. Be able to provide appropriate suggestions for communication of assessment and management of environmental risks and be able to identify how perceived risk, values, politics, ethics and culture influence the approaches used to manage environmental health risk.

PBHT5002 Public Health Law

Course Coordinator: Mrs. Anne CARVER

(2 credits)

Course Description

This module examines the role of law as a tool for public health both within Hong Kong and at international level.

Pre-requisite: HSYS5001

Learning Outcomes/Objectives

Student should be able to:

1. Examine the role that law and lawyers play in protecting the public health and in promoting health, including in relation to both communicable and non-communicable disease
2. Understand the principles of common law, administrative law, public law and of the legislation which purports to regulate the public health.
3. Require consideration of the constitutional limits of the state's power to impose public health interventions on individuals, and of principles of human rights and ethics that serve to protect the rights and dignity of individuals in the context of public benefit.
4. Address the role of the international community in protection of national and global public health.
5. Research the law and relevant LegCo papers for yourself
6. Understand the structure of a Hong Kong Ordinance
7. Analyse the duties and powers of Government Departments relevant to Public Health Law

POPG5005 Global Child & Adolescent Health

Course Coordinator: Prof. Tony NELSON

(2 credits)

Course Description

The purpose of this class is to examine child and adolescent health in developed and developing countries. Biomedical, socio-medical, behavioral, economic and political factors affecting child and teen health will be systematically explored. Health services and health education for children and adolescents will also be addressed.

Learning Outcomes/Objectives

Student should be able to:

1. Apply public health principles to child and adolescent health
2. Examine and discuss issues that affect health outcomes on children and teens. Some of these key issues include vaccination, education, breast-feeding, screening for high-risk behaviors, anticipatory guidance
3. Understand and describe provision of health services to children and young people
4. Gain insight into socio-political factors impacting on child and adolescent health
